ERP COMMENTS

The External Review Panel has reviewed the data for this report and offers these comments on the program's credibility, results and relevance.

CREDIBILITY

The credibility of the SFI program was strengthened this year with the transition to fully independent governance of the program. SFI, Inc. remains unique in forest certification schemes with 37 regional, provincial or state committees, involving over 900 people, engaged in making the program more effective and investigating complaints of poor forest practices.

RESULTS

Rigorous audits of planning and forest practices by independent certification bodies, coupled with continued environmental training of the nation's loggers and foresters, are resulting in improved forest practices on over 135 million acres (54.6 million hectares) of forest land. In addition, program participants invested over 77 million dollars in research to foster continuous improvement in forest management. New marketing efforts by SFI, Inc. will enable consumers to purchase more labeled products coming from these sustainably managed forests – a win for consumers and the forest.

RELEVANCE

Major shifts in land ownership in the U.S. challenge SFI, Inc. to sustain and build enrollment in the program. This was not a problem this year as certified acreage increased to over 133 million acres and new forest landowners generally retained their SFI certification.

The number of landowners assisted by SFI program participants declined 1/3 from 2005, largely, it appears, as the result of industry re-structuring. In recognition of the importance of fostering good management on family owned forests SFI, Inc. will need to expand its efforts to work with organizations that encourage sustainable management of these lands. Landowner outreach programs have significantly contributed to the sustainability of forests throughout the United States, and distinguish SFI certification from other programs.


In order to ensure the relevance of the program to current forest conditions, and fulfill its commitment to continuous improvement, the SFI standard is updated every five years. Pilot projects are underway now to evaluate how issues such as landscape scale management should be reflected in the 2010 standards. Challenges like climate change, carbon trading, and the role of forests in providing renewable energy will all be considered in the 2010 revision process. The Panel will continue to be involved in a review of the program as these and other issues are considered in the years ahead.

A distinguished group of 18 independent experts representing conservation, environmental, professional, academic, and public organizations comprise the independent External Review Panel (ERP). The mission of the External Review Panel is to provide a framework to conduct an independent review of the SFI® program and to ensure the SFI Annual Report fairly states the status of SFI program implementation. The volunteer Panel provides external oversight with their independent review of the current SFI program while seeking steady improvements in sustainable forestry practices.

YEAR IN REVIEW

JANUARY 2006

Minnesota State Forestlands Certified

Nearly 4.8 million acres of state forestland managed by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources were certified to the SFI standard. This created the largest block of publicly owned land to be SFI certified in the United States.

FEBRUARY 2006

New Fiber Sourcing and Chain of Custody Document The SFI releases "Requirements for Fiber Sourcing, Chain of Custody and Product Labels". This document provides guidance to SFI program participants who use SFI on-product labeling. It is also in full conformance with PEFC requirements and legal guidelines.

MARCH 2006

SFI Named Governing Body for PEFC in the US.

The Programme for Endorsement of Forest Certification Schemes (PEFC) endorses the SFI standard and names the SFI the United States PEFC Governing Body. This endorsement by the PEFC will mean increased acceptance of SFI certified products worldwide.

SFI Ad Campaign Wins Award

The Advertising Research Foundations (ARF) honored the SFI with the prestigious Ogivly Award for excellence in advertising in the business-to-business category.

APRIL 2006

Banzhaf Delivers Solutions at Paper Week 2006

MAY 2006

SFI at Forest Leadership Forum

A number of SFI program participants and SFI staff attended the Forest Leadership Forum in Portland, Oregon hosted by Metafore. The forum brought together hundreds of people from around the world to discuss corporate responsibility as it pertains to the forest products industry.

JUNE 2006

PEFC Labeling Authorized

In an agreement between the SFI and PEFC, all certified SFI Program Participants with forest management operations may license to use the PEFC forest management logo with no additional audits. Program Participants can license to use PEFC on-product labeling by completing an audit to the PEFC Chain of Custody standard. There are no PEFC label licensing fees.

JULY 2006

Transition Plan to Full SFI Independence Announced A plan to provide complete independence of the SFI from the American Forestry and Paper Association (AF&PA) was jointly approved by the boards of both organizations. Under the plan a new entity, The Sustainable Forestry Initiative Incorporated will be created to govern all aspects of the SFI program. The date for full independence is set for January 1, 2007.

AUGUST 2006

Pictorial Offset is First SFI CoC Certified Printer
Pictorial Offset Corporation, the largest privately held commercial printer in the United States, is the first printer in the world to earn SFI Chain of Custody Certification. This trail-blazing New Jersey Corporation has long been recognized as a leader among socially responsible companies.

SEPTEMBER 2006

OCTOBER 2006

Speakers Highlight SFI Annual Conference

PILOT PROJECTS

SFI, Inc. has partnered with several organizations (such as Lowes, The Nature Conservancy, Staples and American Bird Conservancy) to establish pilot projects on conservation planning, landscape assessments, the Alliance for Zero Extinction, SFI Standard procurement, invasive species, and the economics of certification standards. All of these pilots will develop new information that may lead to enhancements to the SFI Standard during the 2010 -2014 SFI Standard review.

SFI® IMPLEMENTATION COMMITTEES (SICS) 2006 REPORT SUMMARY

North America's forests are as diverse as those dedicated to managing them. The SFI program is the only forest certification program to bring together local resource leaders for an internationally-recognized standard that works in both production forests and family forests in North America. This means there are more people working locally to ensure sustainable forestry practices are being applied on the ground.

Thirty-seven state and provincial SFI Implementation Committees (SICs) are the local resource leaders that make the SFI Standard work on the ground.

All SICs are required to have processes in place to address any concerns about SFI implementation. This means that in addition to independent audits, there are 37 organizations that also address any concerns about implementation of SFI practices.

In 2006, SICs strengthened SFI Standard compliance by training and educating those with immediate direct impact on forest conservation efforts: landowners, loggers, and foresters. For the first time, two Canadian provinces (New Brunswick and Quebec) reported province-wide SFI training accomplishments in an annual survey conducted by the Forest Resources Association. In 2006, 7,858 loggers completed a SIC-approved training program in the U.S. and Canada; more than 28,000 loggers received partial training.

This logger training helps ensure clean water, better wildlife habitat, and better managed forests.

2006 SIC Highlights

• The Virginia SIC won the 8th Annual SIC Achievement Award for their work on national biodiversity outreach with family forest owners. They

created a web-accessible, one-stop shop for biodiversity education information for eight (8) SICs. Through the American Forest Foundation (AFF) Forests for Watersheds and Wildlife website, family forest owners and SFI participants can access state-specific biodiversity profiles to meet conservation objectives and SFI Standard requirements.

- The MD/DE SIC partnered with state agencies to produce a landowner outreach toolkit specific to SFI Standard requirements.
- The judges for the 2006 SIC Achievement Award nominations also noted Oregon's SIC for publishing a 100-page guidebook of 80 priority plant and animal species. The South Carolina SIC published and distributed 10,000 copies of a 24-page color landowner guide. They also partnered with a state agency to establish online biodiversity resources specific to SFI Standard requirements.
- The Quebec SIC translated the SFI Standard, a tri-fold brochure, a tradeshow display, a new website, and a water-resistant field guide into French. The Washington SIC established a comprehensive new SFI-specific website in 2006. And throughout North America, more than 900 diverse SIC members provided a strong grassroots foundation for the SFI program.
