The Sustainable Forestry Initiative® Inc. is an independent, non-profit organization dedicated to promoting sustainable forest management. SFI® works at the intersection of sustainable forestry, thriving communities and responsible procurement.

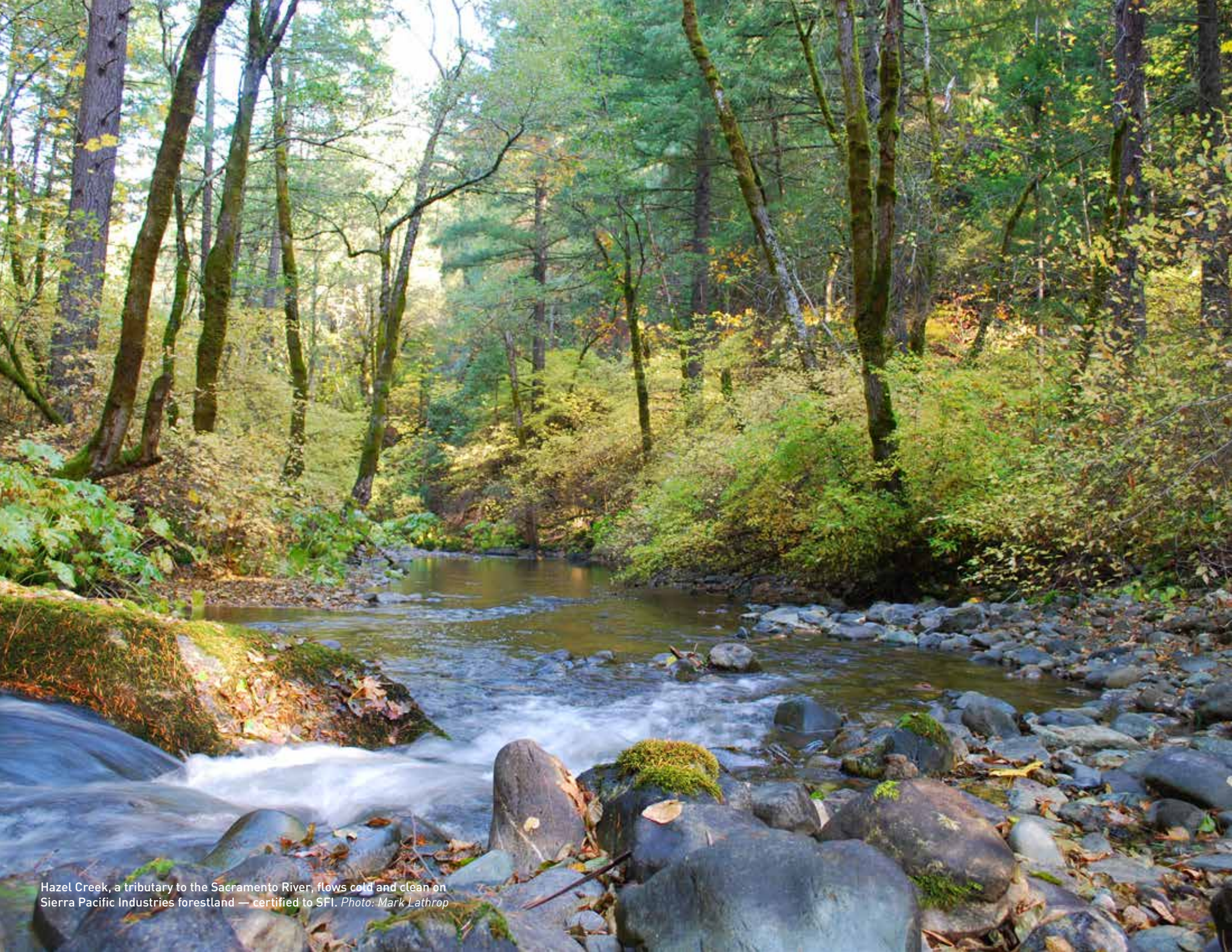
SFI is a solutions-oriented sustainability organization. We collaborate on forest-based conservation and community initiatives that demonstrate and enhance our shared quality of life. And we provide supply chain assurances for brand owners and consumers around the world through standards, data and authentic stories about the life-sustaining value of managed forests.

SFI exemplifies the impact of responsible forestry globally. Our efforts help people, organizations and companies make informed choices when it comes to sustainably sourced forest products and the management of forest resources to ensure a healthy tomorrow.

More than 285 million acres/115 million hectares of forestland is certified to the SFI Forest Management Standard. These lands, stretching from Canada's boreal forest to the U.S. South, are owned and managed by the public and private sectors, conservation groups, Indigenous peoples and academic institutions. Collectively, these lands have the scale to work as a living research lab for forest conservation and responsible management.

SFI Inc. is governed by the SFI Board, which sets SFI's strategic direction and is responsible for overseeing and improving the internationally recognized SFI Program and SFI standards. The Board's three chambers represent environmental, social and economic sectors equally.

Their accomplishments are celebrated in many places in this report. Thank you to everyone in the SFI community. Together, we are making a difference.

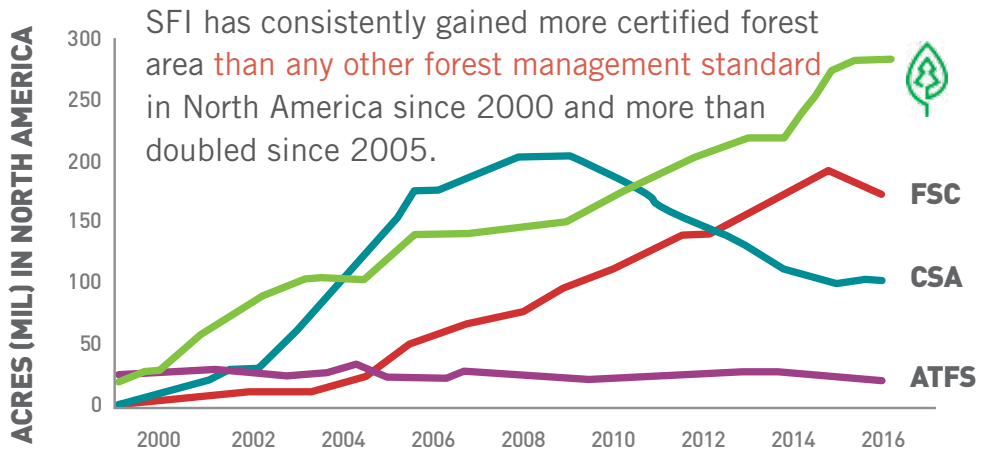

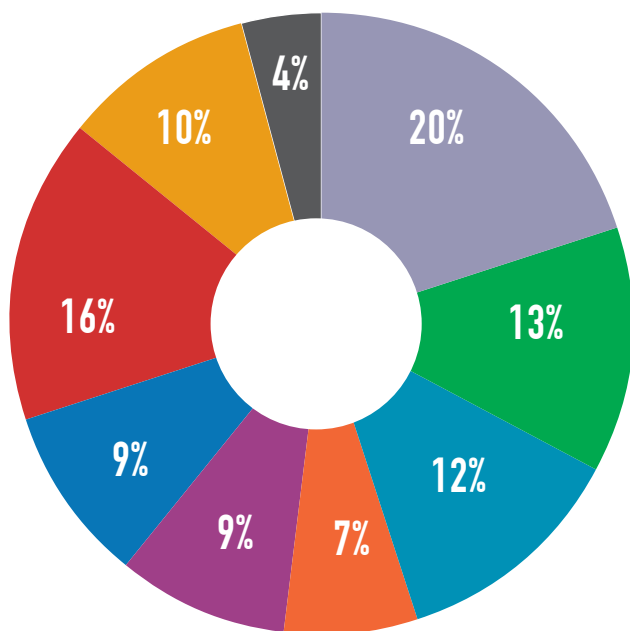

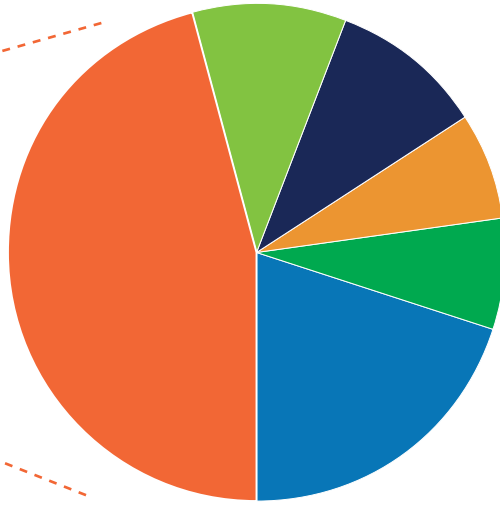

SFI RESEARCH ON VERNAL POOLS HELPS CONSERVE IMPORTANT

AMPHIBIAN HABITAT



Amphibians are at risk worldwide. Research on vernal pools will help conserve this important amphibian habitat.

SFI Supports Research on Amphibians to Conserve Biodiversity

Support from SFI is facilitating cooperation between academics, forest managers and conservationists to help conserve species that live in vernal pools – seasonal ponds filled with water or melted snow – on the Kenauk Nature reserve. The Kenauk Nature property, which covers 26,000 hectares near Montreal and is partly owned by the Nature Conservancy of Canada, is certified to SFI.

“This research, which takes advantage of new DNA technologies, plays a key role in improving understanding of the diversity of life in vernal pool ecosystems across North American deciduous forests. The results will help guide responsible forest management in these ecosystems.”

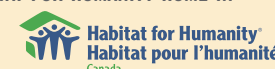
Building Homes and Building Communities

GRANTS PROGRAM

SFI grants support partnerships with conservation groups to enhance understanding of the value of forest management across North America.

The SFI Conservation and Community Partnerships Grants Program

Since 2010, SFI conservation grants have contributed \$3.4 million to conservation research and pilot efforts, and leveraged nearly three times that much from partner organizations. Projects include improving wildlife habitat management, research on recovery of species-at-risk, and developing new methods to measure conservation values.

“SFI is a strong partner in our work to quantify carbon storage in Canada’s forests and boreal forest wetlands. Wetland conservation is important for carbon and for other environmental values like waterfowl habitat, biodiversity and water-quality protection.”

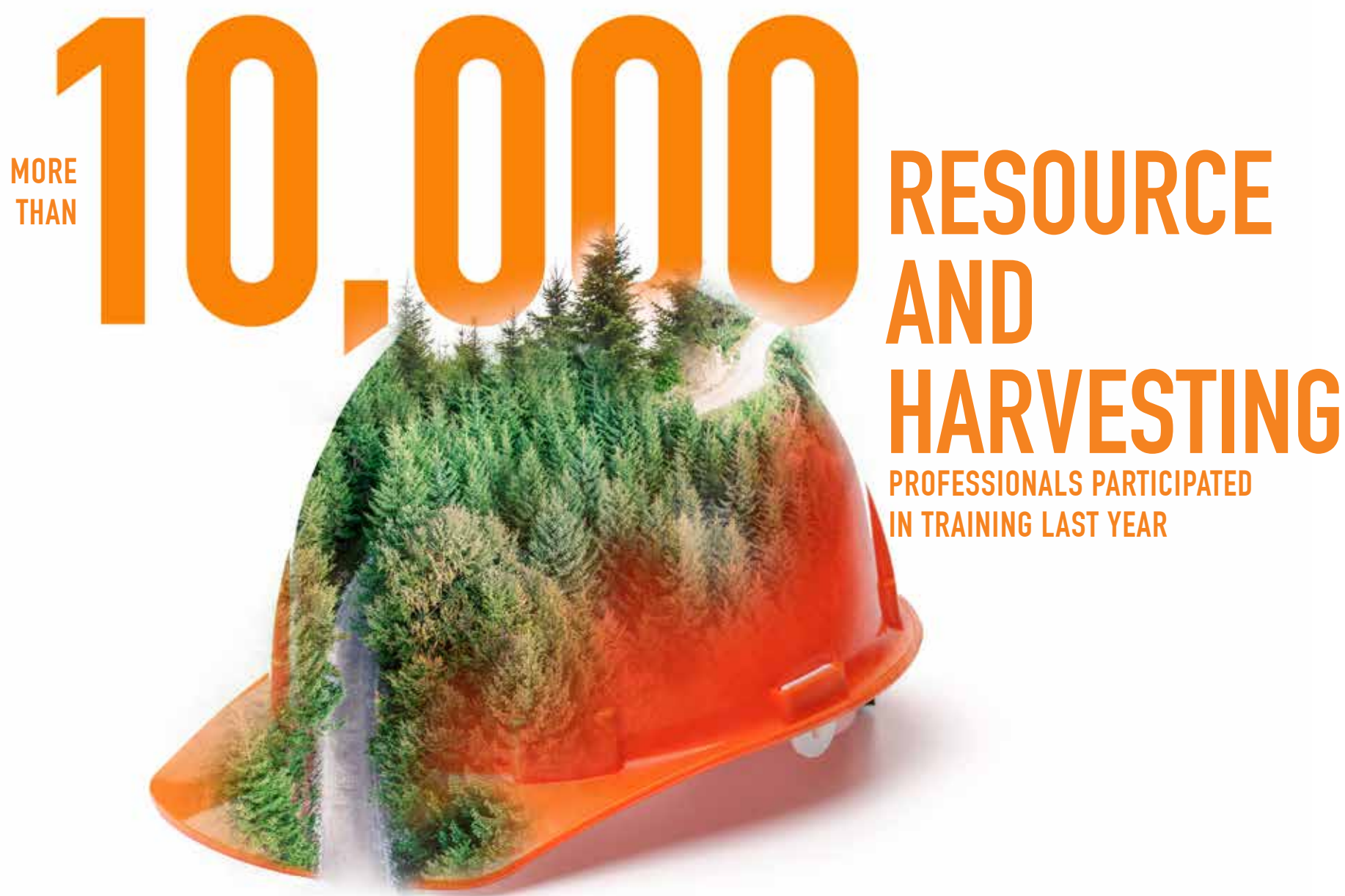

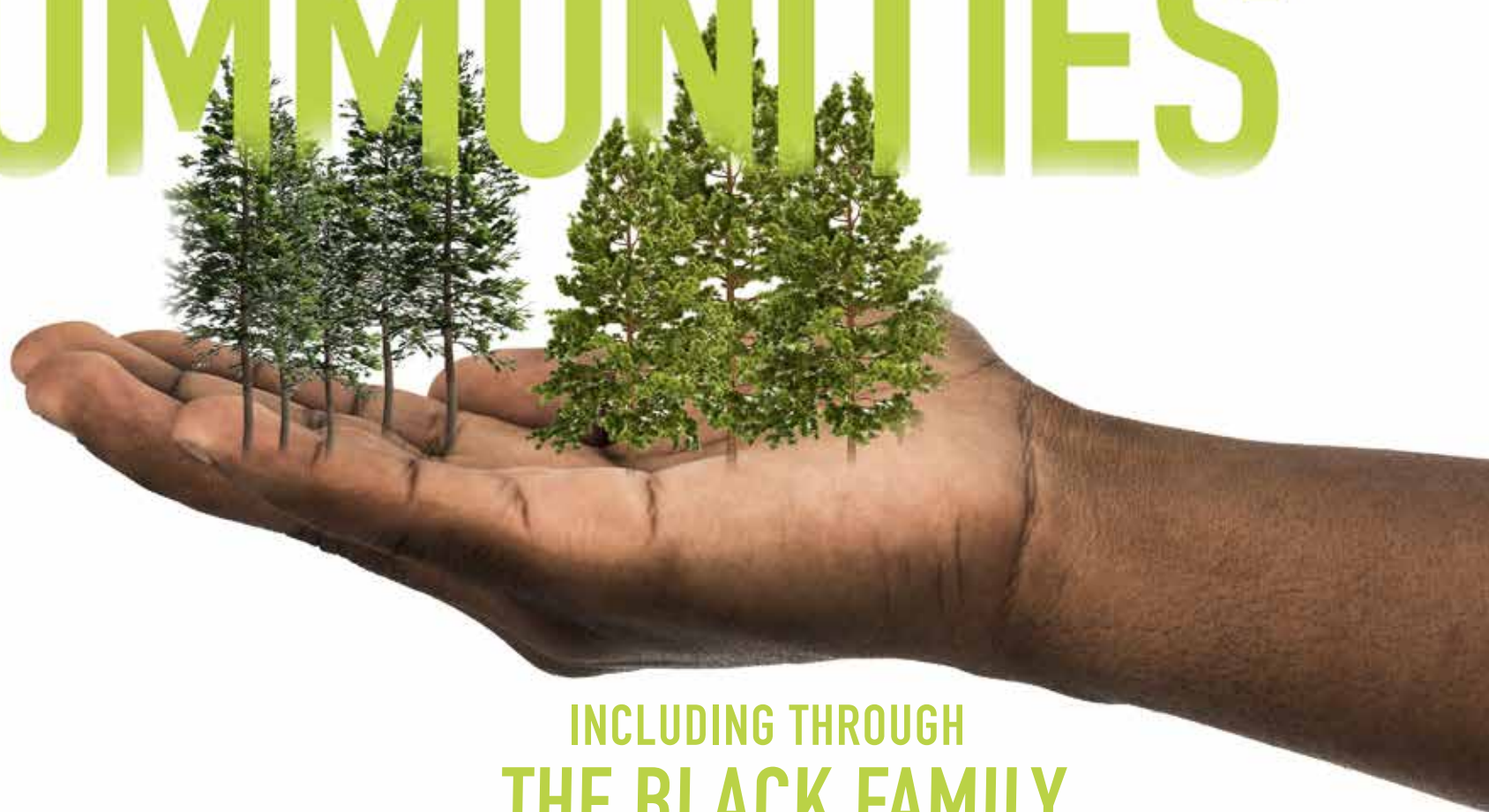

Helping Birds Thrive in the Boreal Forest

SFI is helping boreal birds by supporting the University of Alberta's Boreal Avian Modelling (BAM) Project. The BAM project is developing models to help land managers, including forest managers, understand the diversity of habitats birds need for breeding. This work will help conserve forested habitats now and in future for a variety of birds.

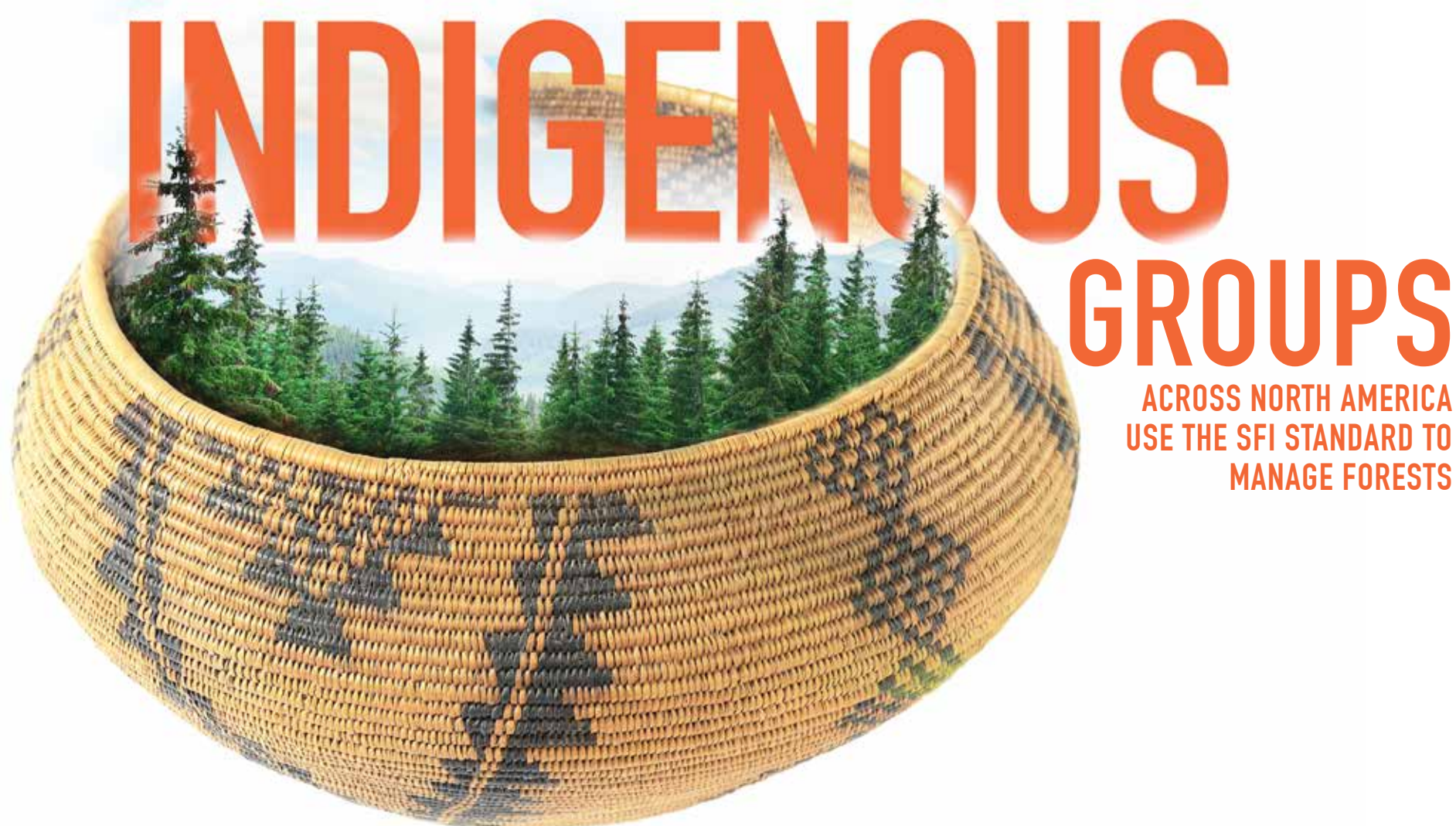

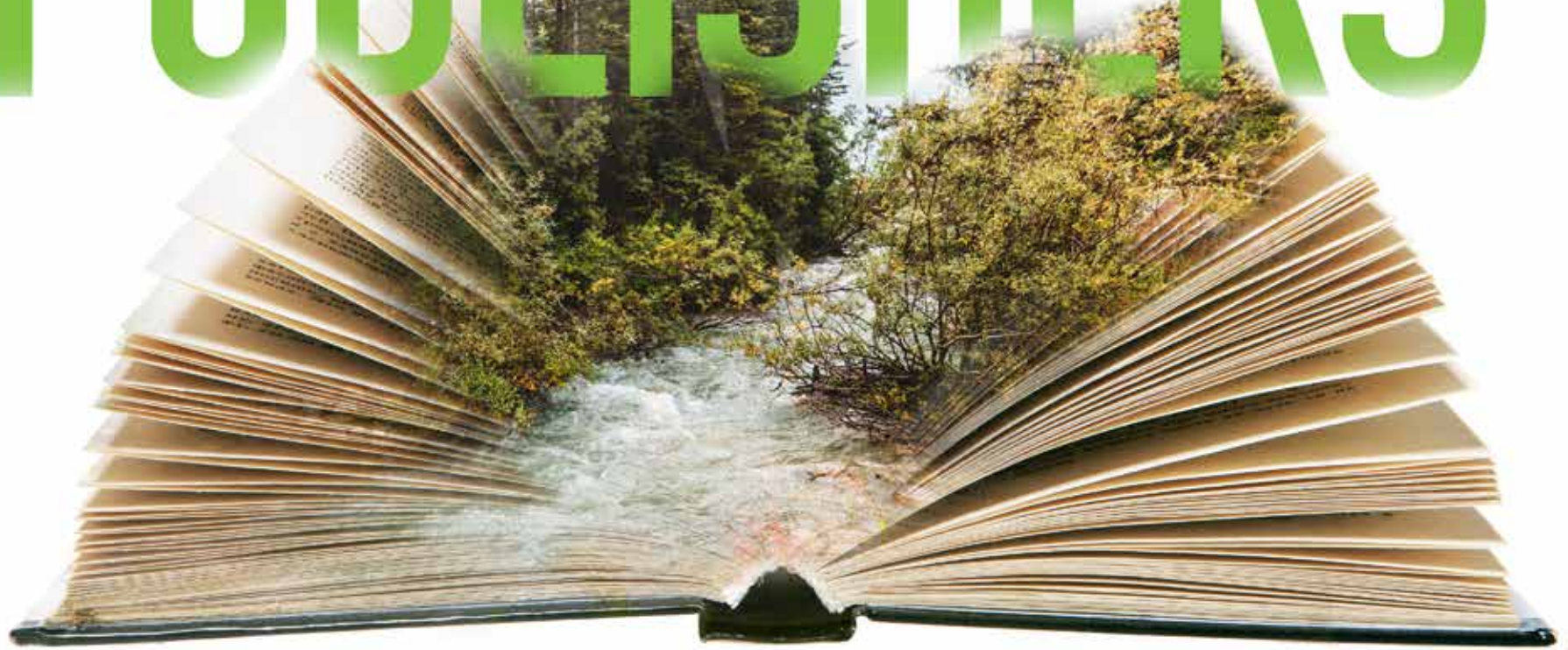

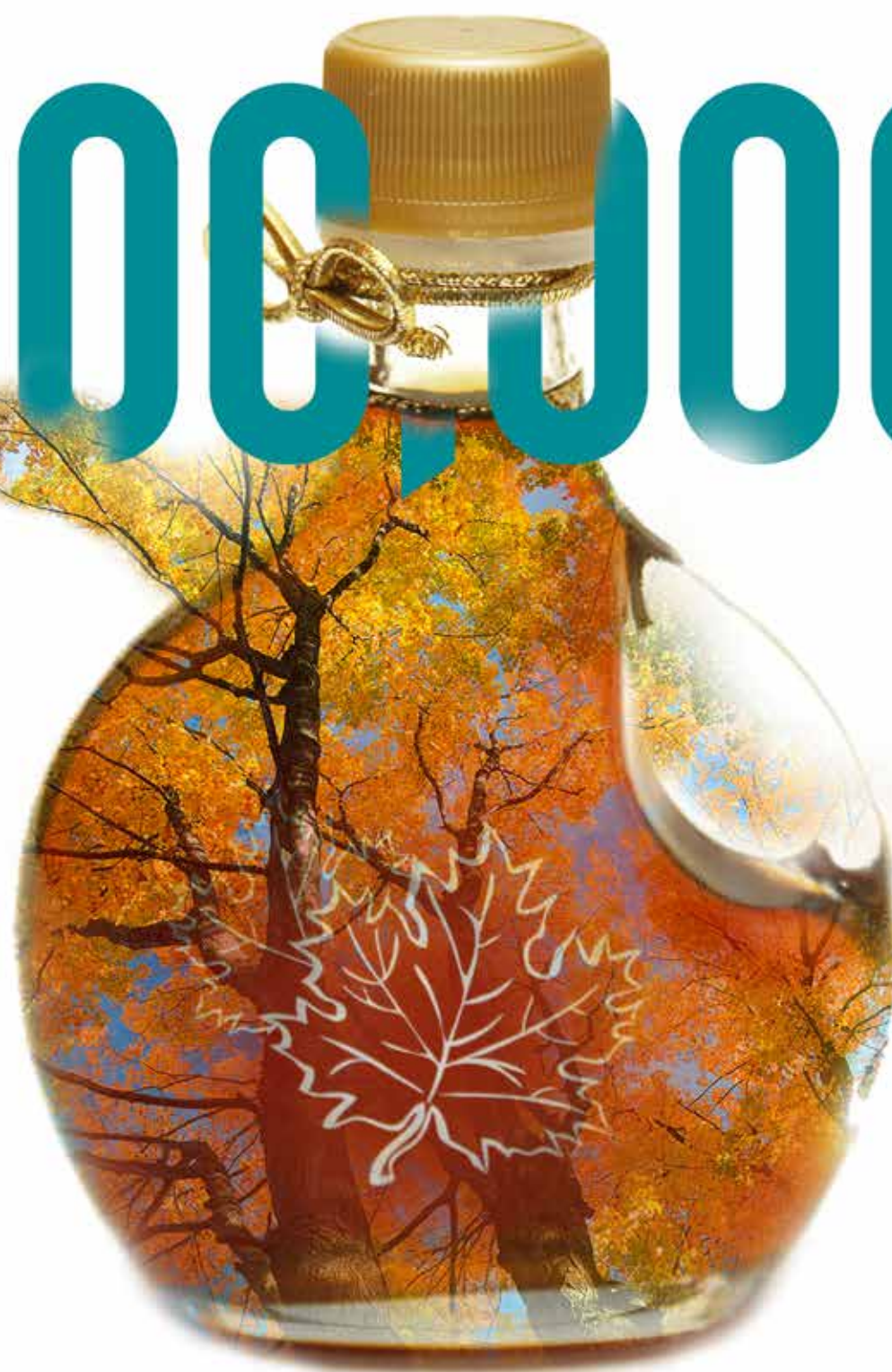

SFI has no role in determining whether a certificate is granted—this decision is made independently by the certification bodies.
